

English

The children will build on their writing skills learnt from the previous two terms. In the first half of the term, they will construct a diary entry using our class text, 'There's a Boy in the Girls' Bathroom'. The latter half of the term will see the children produce an information text, which links to our Science topic, on the circulatory system.

Maths

This term, the children will continue their excellent learning on fractions by identifying links between them, decimals and percentages. They will use their place value skills to recognise a number up to 2 and 3 decimal places, before comparing and ordering numbers shown in different representations.

RE

Children will study the religion of Buddhism and why Buddha is seen as an important figure to Buddhists today. They will understand how this religion focuses on spiritual development and when it was discovered using the story of Prince Siddhartha and his journey to achieve enlightenment.

Science

The children will learn about themselves and how parts of our body works. They will identify and name the main parts of the human circulatory system, describing the functions of the heart, blood vessels and blood. They will recognise the impact of diet, exercise, drugs and lifestyle on the ways their bodies function, before describing the ways in which nutrients and water are transported around our bodies.

Good to be Me!

Geography

Children will investigate the local area, using fieldwork to measure and record human and physical features. They will then be given the opportunity to use atlases, maps and compasses to use in practical demonstrations.

PSHE

Children will study a 'Healthy Me' unit of learning where they will learn all about how to lead a healthy lifestyle. They will know the importance of a well-balanced diet as well as how vital exercise is on our physical and mental health.

DT

Children will learn how to prepare and cook healthy meals as part of a healthy, balanced diet. They will understand the seasonality of food and the countries in which they are sourced from.

History

Children will begin an exciting unit into the study of crime and punishment during the Roman era, up until the present day. They will learn about which crimes were strictly forbidden and how these were particularly dealt with. They will compare each era with one another, drawing on their similarities and differences.
